Scope

Kayak 2 Profile

The NZOIA Kayak 2 is able to:

- Demonstrate kayak skills on class 4 white water
- Lead and manage groups on class 3 white water
- Apply effective safety management
- Teach intermediate/advanced kayak rolling
- Teach intermediate/advanced flat water kayak skills
- Teach intermediate/advanced moving water skills
- Teach intermediate/advanced river running skills
- Teach river rescue techniques
- Role model and promote accepted environmental practices

Scope

The holder of this qualification can:

- Organise, instruct and guide kayaking on class 3 white water
- Teach intermediate/advanced kayak skills on flat to class 3 white water

Prerequisites

Be a current Registered Member of NZOIA

Be 20 years old or over

Hold a current First Aid Certificate

Hold a current NZOIA Kayak 1 qualification. Refer to NZOIA's policy for exemptions.

Hold a NZOIA/WWNZ River Rescue 2 certificate

Have the following experience as evidence in a logbook.

Personal experience – at least:

- 100 river trips on 10 different river sections
- 20 river trips on class 4 white water (or above)

Instructional experience – at least:

- 40 river trips including
- 20 river trips leading and managing groups on class 3 white water (or above)

Instructing intermediate/advanced kayak skills:

- Rolling 10 sessions
- Flat water 10 sessions
- Moving water 10 sessions
- River rescue techniques 10 sessions

A valid teaching session is an organised event with expected outcomes.

A river trip is considered to be at least 2 hours duration from put in to get out on a recognised section of a river.

The prerequisite experience requirements are minimums, extra days are recommended so that a broad range of experience is gained. Experience will include co-instructing/guiding or working as an assistant instructor/guide.

Registration and Revalidation

Registration and revalidation with NZOIA provide proof of currency for NZOIA qualification holders.

Syllabus

Assessment Notes

This syllabus outlines what the content of the assessment will include and gives an idea of what assessment tasks the candidate will be asked to complete. All judgements on how the candidate meets the syllabus must be based on current good practice and industry standards.

Assessors use three types of direct evidence to judge a candidate's competency:

- Written questions/assignment
- Questioning and discussion
- Observation of practical tasks

Depending on location and conditions Assessors may use scenarios for candidates to demonstrate knowledge and skills.

The NZOIA Kayak 2 candidate is expected to demonstrate any of the competencies outlined in the NZOIA Kayak 1 Scope and Syllabus, as well as the following competencies:

Technical Competence

1. Demonstrate knowledge of contemporary issues

The candidate will understand and show awareness of:

- 1.1** Current threats to New Zealand's rivers and the effect these have on recreational river use
- 1.2** Legislation relevant to kayaking

2. Demonstrate knowledge of kayaking and the history of kayaking

The candidate will understand and show awareness of:

- 2.1 The development of kayaking as a sport including current trends
- 2.2 The types of white water kayaking currently undertaken in New Zealand e.g. slalom, freestyle, extreme racing, multisport
- 2.3 The role and contribution of relevant associations to white water kayaking e.g. Whitewater NZ, Recreation Aotearoa, DOC

The candidate will be able to:

- 2.4 Identify and critique learning resources for kayak instruction/techniques

3. Demonstrate and/or describe the care and correct use of kayak equipment and clothing

The candidate will:

- 3.1 Have in-depth knowledge about types of kayaking equipment available
- 3.2 Be able to impart knowledge to intermediate/advanced level kayakers about kayaks, equipment and clothing appropriate for use on class 3 white water
- 3.3 Demonstrate a working knowledge of a variety of kayak safety equipment
- 3.4 Role model equipment that is in good condition and well maintained for use up to and including class 4 white water environments
- 3.5 Carry and use equipment appropriate for a class 4 river environment
- 3.6 Demonstrate safe transportation of kayaks on trailers and/or roof racks
- 3.7 Describe the use of, advantages and limitations of different methods of communication on the river e.g. PLB, satellite messenger, hand and paddle signals

4. River rescue skills on class 3

The candidate will demonstrate:

- 4.1 Instructor assisted and instructor intervention rescues including:
 - Two of the following three rescues; Bow (or T) Rescue, Assisted H Rescue, Barrel Roll
 - Transport a swimmer across the river using a bow carry or a stern deck carry and a tow
 - Deep water rescue (recommended time for kayak emptied, kayaker back in and spray deck on is 2 minutes)
- 4.2 Knowledge and use of an effective towline system including:
 - Capsize, release and roll
 - Assisted ferry glide
 - Towing – a kayak and a paddle
 - Rescue of an unconscious swimmer

- 4.3** Rescuing a swimmer using a throw bag: attention gained, accurate throw, stable belay, safe pendulum
- 4.4** A recovery and management strategy for dealing with a pinned/stranded kayaker or swimmer
- 4.5** A recovery system for a pinned kayak using pulley/mechanical advantage systems and show an understanding of the limitations and dangers of these systems (for assessment efficiency this can be done as a simulated rescue on land)
- 4.6** Using an improvised harness to ascend/descend a rope with standard river rescue equipment
- 4.7** A working knowledge of management strategies for a given river rescue scenario

5. Personal intermediate/advanced kayak skills

The candidate will demonstrate kayaking on class 4 including:

- 5.1** A reliable roll
- 5.2** Controlled river running including choosing lines and routes down rapids

The candidate will demonstrate the following role model kayaking skills (i.e. making good visual images suitable for clients to learn from) on class 3:

- 5.3** A kayak roll on both sides
- 5.4** Safe and efficient river running and river moves including choosing lines/routes down rapids
- 5.5** A range of efficient and effective paddling techniques including:
 - Boat: angle, edging/railing, speed
 - Body: position, rotation, looking
 - Blade: forward, reverse, sweeps strokes, bracing, gliding draw strokes (stern to bow) to maintain speed and control turning radius
- 5.6** Carve, skid and pivot turns
- 5.7** Forward and reverse ferry gliding

The candidate will demonstrate a range of skills to enhance a client's river running skills and experience:

- 5.8** Personal intermediate freestyle and river play moves for example:
 - Waves; surfing, carving, flat spin
 - Holes; maneuver, spin, blast
 - Eddy line; stern squirt, screw up, stall, cartwheel
- 5.9** Practical knowledge of slalom skills:
 - Applying slalom techniques to enhance a client's river running skills
 - Upstream gate techniques; 'S' turn, control maintaining speed, stroke placement and timing
 - Downstream gate techniques; stagger sequence, maintaining speed, effective use of inside pole
 - Posture; use of core, body rotation, upright body, head up

The Environment

8. Role model and promote accepted environmental practices

The candidate will:

- 8.1** Demonstrate and/or describe the responsibilities to land owners and other river users including access protocols
- 8.2** Role model and promote the principles of the New Zealand Water Care Code
- 8.3** Role model and promote the principles of Leave No Trace
- 8.4** Demonstrate an awareness of practices to stop the spread of freshwater pests and weeds
- 8.5** Role model and promote cultural awareness and respect of Māori, tāngata whenua and all international visitors
- 8.6** Discuss concepts of Te Ao Māori specific to the river environment including kaitiakitanga

Group Management and Leadership

9. Lead and manage a group kayaking up to and including class 3 white water

The candidate will demonstrate competent leadership and management of a group on class 3 white water which includes:

- 9.1** A river safety brief before the session or river trip commences
- 9.2** Awareness and disclosure of relevant hazards encountered and suitable management techniques
- 9.3** Effective and proactive management of the group including but not limited to; anticipation of capsizes, dealing with differences in abilities of party members, protecting rapids as appropriate
- 9.4** An effective communication system for managing the group
- 9.5** Establishing rapport and using a leadership style appropriate to the group
- 9.6** Organise and motivate a group/individual in a white water environment

10. Apply effective safety management

The candidate will demonstrate:

- 10.1** Safe practices and good judgement and decision making within the scope of this qualification
- 10.2** The ability to access and apply weather and up-to-date river information (including river flow) as appropriate for a planned session or river trip
- 10.3** Have a first aid kit and be able to deal with first aid situations as required

10.4 Awareness of the risks and appropriate risk management strategies during a given river trip and the ability to adjust plans when required

10.5 Awareness of the prevention, symptoms, and treatment for medical issues relevant to kayaking e.g. near drowning, hypothermia, shock, sunburn, dehydration, shoulder dislocation

Instruction

11. Prepare and deliver teaching sessions

The candidate will:

11.1 Develop aims based on knowledge of clients and timeframes

11.2 Plan a logical and safe sequence of teaching progressions

11.3 Select and prepare a suitable location for client success

11.4 Brief the clients and outline the learning outcomes

11.5 Demonstrated a wide and in-depth knowledge of the topic

11.6 Use a variety of clear demonstrations and explanations

11.7 Be able to discuss the theory behind a particular technique

11.8 Use appropriate terminology

11.9 Use a range of teaching skills and methods

11.10 Provide opportunities for clients to practice

11.11 Deliver a variety of feedback methods that are timely and specific

11.12 Adapt the session to suit the client needs and progress

11.13 Maintain a positive learning environment

12. Teach intermediate/advanced kayak rolling

The candidate will demonstrate:

12.1 The ability to critique and enhance an existing sweep roll

12.2 Teaching another rolling technique applicable to the clients e.g. C to C, back deck, hand roll

13. Teach intermediate/advanced flat water kayak skills

The candidate will demonstrate:

13.1 The ability to teach a range of kayak strokes and techniques on flat water appropriate to the client's needs e.g.

- Forward and reverse strokes
- Sweep strokes
- Bracing (low/high)
- Turning techniques (carve, skid, pivot)
- Draw strokes (to move a kayak sideways)

- Gliding draw strokes (range of stern to bow) to maintain speed and control turning radius

14. Teach intermediate/advanced moving water kayak skills

The candidate will demonstrate:

- 14.1** The ability to teach a range of kayak strokes and techniques on moving water appropriate to the client's needs e.g.
- Short to long radius eddy turns (carve, skid, pivot)
 - Eddy turn stroke combinations; forward paddling, gliding draw strokes (range of stern to bow) to maintain speed and control turning radius
 - Ferry gliding
 - River moves (S-turn/cross, use of river features),
- 14.2** Teaching kayak skills that prepare clients for a class 3 river trip

15. Teach class 3 river running skills

The candidate will demonstrate:

- 15.1** Selecting a suitable river trip
- 15.2** Identifying river features and how to use them
- 15.3** Identifying river hazards and how to avoid them
- 15.4** Effective communication including the use of paddle signals
- 15.5** River running and management strategies including scouting and choosing safe lines through rapids
- 15.6** Teaching kayak skills to enhance clients' ability to paddle class 3 white water

16. Teach river rescue techniques

The candidate will demonstrate:

- 16.1** The ability to teach a range of river rescue techniques appropriate to the client's needs e.g.
- Bow rescue (T-rescue)
 - Assisted H Rescue
 - Barrel roll-ups
 - Assisted ferry gliding/river running
 - Use and limitations of swimmer carries (bow carry, stern carry, tow)
 - Deep water rescue/s
 - Use and limitations of effective towline systems
 - Rescue of an unconscious patient, with or without the aid of a kayak
 - Throw bag uses and limitations
 - White water swimming techniques
 - Use of pulley/mechanical advantage systems to recover a pinned kayak
 - Methods for dealing with a pinned/stranded kayaker or swimmer
